Virginia's GWEP addresses a critical national priority.

Through statewide partnerships, healthcare providers, caregivers, and support personnel—particularly in underserved and rural areas—receive training to deliver improved care, aligned with HHS and HRSA goals. <u>This work advances</u> <u>federal investments in workforce development geriatric care delivery.</u>



We are preparing an educated, interprofessional workforce to care for our rapidly aging population.

The Virginia Geriatrics Workforce Enhancement Program is set to receive \$5 Million in HRSA Funding from July 2024 until June 2029.

In Virginia, our VGEC and GWEP train about 5,000 professionals every year with critical knowledge and skills.

Last year alone, Virginia GWEP provided geriatric training with critical knowledge and skills to:

- 4,000+ physicians, nurses, pharmacists, dentists, physical therapists, social
 workers and other health professionals to better care for their older adult
 patients, resulting in improved health and longevity across the state of
 Virginia.
- 1,000+ health professions students, including medical, dental, nursing, pharmacy, social work and physical therapy students to better prepare them to enter into the geriatric field across the state of Virginia and beyond.



GWEP targets areas of the state which are medically underserved, such as rural communities.

Equipping older adult caregivers in our communities is essential.



Virginia GWEP also provided training to <u>hundreds of caregivers</u>, to better equip them to take care of their loved ones, and directly to hundreds of older adults living in the communities, to help them learn how to take care of themselves physically and mentally.

ISSUE BRIEF

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Emergency Medical Services (EMS) providers are <u>uniquely poised to implement de-escalation techniques and help with early identification</u> and referral for those who have been identified as living with dementia. Yet – <u>they receive little to no formalized training</u> in the care of older adults in their standardized curriculum.

We partnered with EMS providers throughout the state to <u>provide training in appropriate techniques for working with those living with dementia during emergency response</u>. Our training has been well-received throughout the state and to expand this work, we are conducting focus groups with rural EMS agencies to better understand their needs related to caring for older adults in their communities. We plan to expand the available training to EMS providers based on this needs assessment.



Voices from the Field




